The development, adjacent to Canada Water and Surrey Quays stations and covering over 50 acres, will deliver a new urban centre for London with up to 5m sq ft of workspace, retail, leisure, culture and residential alongside higher

educational and community uses.
Emma joined British Land from Landsec where she delivered a number of Central London developments including Wellington House, Kings Gate and the Zig Zag building in Victoria, as well as overseeing their strategic land portfolio. Prior to this, Emma held development and land management roles at house builders Barratt and Crest Nicholson.

Tamsie is Director of the London Festival of Architecture, Honorary Fellow of the RIBA, and Advisory Board member of the Woolwich Contemporary Print Fair. Tamsie started her architectural training in Edinburgh and has both an MA Housing (ECA) and an MSc Urban Design and Social Science (LSE). Her career has focused on the more social aspects of architecture, working at both the Civic Trust and Shelter, before running the built environment think tank Building Futures.

Before joining LFA Tamsie was Director for London at the RIBA, developing cultural programming including the Regent Street Windows project, Architecture Open and Forgotten Spaces. She also ran international trade missions and a significant CPD programme. Tamsie also spent several years running a design studio at the University of Brighton. As Director for the LFA, Tamsie has grown the Festival to be the world's largest architecture festival with an audience of over 600,000 people and 560 events.

His responsibilities at the Municipality of Tirana consist of the surprises, urgencies and expectations of a bustling vibrant capital in the centre of the Balkans. Collaborative creative processes, leading from behind, alternative planning methodologies, and quick and practical fixes would best describe his daily duties; but dealing with administrative bureaucracy, piles of paperwork, building permitting and cross-institutional collaboration, often gets in the way. He is extremely passionate about architecture and planning and is currently focused on exploring innovation in urban redevelopment while employing more sustainable, implementable and functional planning methodologies.
